ABOUT THE GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP PROJECT...

During Spring Break earlier this month, 60 members of the Shenandoah University community traveled abroad – all expenses paid – to one of five destinations: China, Mexico, South Africa, Turkey and the United Arab Emirates. The participants – students, faculty, staff and trustees – submitted essay applications in November that were reviewed by a selection committee from the university. Applicants had to be prepared to go anywhere and agreed to embrace all that their adventures would offer, as they set out to explore the world, meet new friends and colleagues, and learn more about what it means to be a citizen in our increasingly global community.



Shenandoah University advocates the advancement of learning between cultures through a variety of international programs, preparing citizens who are committed to making responsible contributions within a community, a nation and a world. Now in its fifth year, Shenandoah's Global Experiential Learning (GEL) program was created to provide students with faculty-guided, credit-bearing educational study experiences abroad. Using the highly effective GEL model, the Global Citizenship Project was developed last year to enable more members of the university community to experience what the world has to offer to their educational and professional development.

The Global Citizenship Project honors the memory of a dear friend of Shenandoah University, and a member of the board of trustees, Dr. Nancy Larrick Crosby. An internationally recognized expert on reading and an editor of 20 anthologies of poetry for children, Dr. Crosby was instrumental in championing the precious gifts of literature and literacy for generations of young readers around the world. Dr. Crosby was co-founder of the International Reading Association, which now has more than 300,000 members in 99 countries, and she was instrumental in helping to shape the highly acclaimed Children's Literature Conference, which marks its 21st anniversary this summer at Shenandoah University.
